Statistics throw up information on the extent of child abuse and neglect. They have established beyond doubt that child abuse exists in India and the incidence is much higher than generally perceived, the situation is alarming. The graph shows that the cases of physical, sexual and emotional abuse among children has gone considerably from 1980 to 1993. Against 3.1 lakh children 5.7 lakh were physically abused in 1993. And the rise in sexual abuse was nearly 2.5 lakh cases. For the emotional abuse cases, there was an increase of 0.9 lakh cases. Munshi Premchand's original name was Dhanpat Rai. He was born on 31 July, 1880 in village Lamhi in Uttar Pradesh. Premchand's mother died when he was seven years old. He was married against his will at the early age of fifteen. He took up school teaching job and earned Rupees 18 a month. Premchand worked as the deputy sub-inspector of schools. He died on 8th October 1936. Premchand has written about 300 stories, a dozen novels and two plays. He used a simple language. Idgah, Godaan and Nirmala are a few of his famous literary works. He was a great social reformer. His writings against corruption, poverty, zamindari, etc., reflect his social reform ideas.

2. RAJIV GANDHI

Rajiv Gandhi, former Prime Minister of India, was born on 20th August, 1944 in Mumbai. On 21st May, 1991, Rajiv Gandhi was assassinated at Sriperumbudur in Tamil Nadu by a suicide bomb blast. He married Sonia Gandhi in 1968. His son is Rahul Gandhi and daughter Priyanka Gandhi. He studied at Trinity College, University of Cambridge. He was a member of Delhi Flying Club and there he was trained as a pilot. He was employed as a pilot by Air India. On 31 October 1984, the then Prime Minister, Rajiv Gandhi's mother Indira Gandhi, was assassinated and then he became the Prime Minister of India. He was awarded the Bharat Ratna, India's highest civilian recognition, posthumously in 1991.

- 1. The soil in which crop has to be grown is prepared by ploughing. Ploughing is usually done after the first shower of rain which loosens the soil. After ploughing, the seeds are sown. Irrigation or supply of water is essential after seeds sprout. Water logging may damage the crop. Weeds are unwanted plants which grow among crops. They are removed by pulling them by hands. The nutrients required by the growing crop are provided at regular intervals through supplements of natural source (manure) or chemical compounds (fertilizers). Once the crop is matured, it is cut and gathered. This process is called harvesting. Followed by harvesting, grains are separated from the chaff either by threshing or manually in small scale called winnowing. Grains yielded are stored in granaries or bins for later use.
- 2. The above table depicts the cropping pattern in Haryana for the period of 2014-2015. The production of food grains show a considerable change. Wheat production has increased from 45 million tonnes in 2014 to 50 million tonnes in 2015. The production of rice and pulses have decreased. While the yield of rice and pulses in 2014 was 55 and 12 million tonnes respectively, the yield of rice and pulses have gone down to 53 and 10 million tonnes respectively in 2015. This decrease could be attributed to the quality or variety of seeds, irrigation facilities, chemical fertilizers, etc.




